Thank you Father for giving us NEW BIRTH into a LIVING HOPE through the RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST, and for an INHERITANCE that can never spoil or fade—kept for us in heaven! Amen

This is our last newsletter for the Term. Term One has been a very busy and successful start to the College's Year. Next weekend is Easter and the start of the school holidays.

Easter is celebrated as one Feast over 3 days, called the Easter Triduum. Easter, the resurrection of Jesus, is the core of our faith. On Holy Thursday Mass, we re-enact Jesus' washing of his disciples' feet and remember his institution of the Eucharist. Mass ends silently with the removal of Jesus, reminding us of his arrest. No Masses are said anywhere in the world from Thursday night until the Easter Vigil. Good Friday is so-called because by his Passion and death, Christ saved us all. This is remembered at the commemoration of the Passion in the afternoon. The third part of the Triduum is the Easter Vigil on Saturday night. This is where the Paschal Candle is lit from the Easter fire and we enter the church by candlelight. At the vigil we hear the stories of creation and of God's covenant with his chosen people. These Easter services are unlike any others – even if you haven't been for some time, it is well worth attending. You will be very welcome.

The College's Easter Liturgy is on Thursday, the last day of term between 12 and 12.30pm. We would like to extend an invitation to all our parents and families to attend. The Liturgy will conclude with a shared lunch Passover meal for the whole College. The buses will run early and students will be dismissed from school at 2.05pm.

We have thoroughly enjoyed the Japanese students from Shibuya Junior High School in Tokyo being here, they departed very early Tuesday morning. A very big thank you to the host families for sharing your home with the Japanese students. They greatly enjoyed their stay and we look forward to a return visit.

Our annual House Athletics were held on Wednesday with excellent participation by students in spite of the very windy weather. A full report is inside this newsletter.

This week has seen our Parent Teacher Interviews held at Leongatha, with Wonthaggi interviews taking place next Tuesday evening. Parents taking a direct interest in your child's education is the single most powerful way you can contribute to their success – thank you for continuing to support us in such numbers.

Classes resume on Tuesday 17 April, I wish all students and families a relaxing and safe holiday. Happy Easter to all!

This wonderful resource informs them of their daily timetable, lists the daily notices and ensures that they have quick and ready access to key learning materials. PAM...the "Parent Access Module" allows Parents and Guardians, access this information as well. PAM access codes have been sent to all new families and all established families could use their existing code from last year to access this site.

Parents will now be able to gain access to student's work when marked, see upcoming work submission dates, view teacher feedback and obtain school reports.

Parent/Teacher/Student Interviews:

We also use PAM for progressive and continuous reporting and for online booking of Parent/Teacher/Student Interviews.

Parents and Guardians are able to access the interim reports on PAM for their child. The Interim Reports can be found under the Assessment Reports section for each student. You are able to print these at home and bring along to the evening.

Parent/Teacher/Student Interview Nights are an important evening as it is an invaluable opportunity to speak to members of the teaching staff face-to-face for a period of 5 minutes to discuss all aspects of student learning.

When considering school reports and teacher feedback:

Your children will appreciate the right focus at report time Could try harder... always does her best... lacks concentration...easily distracted...a pleasure to teach...

School reports can mean anxious times for children too. 'Will my parents be disappointed or proud?' is the main concern of most children. Kids of all ages take their cues from their parents, so your reaction to their school report can affect the way they see themselves as learners and as people.

Focus your attention on these aspects to make sense of children's reports:

Expectations

Expectations are tricky. If they are too high, then kids can be turned off learning. Too low and there is nothing to strive for. Pitch your expectations in line with a child's abilities. A quick check of your child's last report cards may give you a good yardstick.

Different rates of learning

Remember there are slow bloomers, late developers and steady -as-you-go kids in every classroom, so avoid comparing your child to siblings, your friends' children and even yourself when you were young. Instead, look for individual progress.

Safeguard confidence

Self-confidence is a pre-requisite for learning, so be prepared to be as positive and encouraging as possible

Here are 5 of Michael Grosse's ideas to think about before reading your child's report:

1. Look for strengths first. Focus on strengths even if they are not in the traditional 3Rs or core subjects.

2. Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning. If the report indicates that effort is below standard, then you have something to work on. If your child is putting in the required effort, then you cannot ask any more than that.

3. Broaden your focus away from academic performance to form a picture of your child's progress as a member of a social setting. How your child gets along with his or her peers will influence their happiness and well-being, as well as give an indicator to their future.

4. Take note of student's self-assessment. Kids are generally very honest and will give a realistic assessment of their progress. They are generally very perceptive so take note of their opinions.

5. Discuss the report with your child talking about strengths first before looking at areas that need improvement. Ask your child how they performed and discuss their concerns.

Be mindful that no matter how good, bad or indifferent your child's report may be, he or she can wipe the slate clean and make a fresh start next term!

Our College Easter celebration liturgy prepares our students by assisting them to reflect on the Holy Week symbols and their meaning for us.

This is a wonderful expression of love and how we as Christians celebrate the Eucharistic banquet together at home and together at Mass. What games they have installed on/through **launch pad** - you can access the launch pad through **Finder** You can also check the browsing history of Safari, Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox or other internet content tools.

Any student who is found to have any inappropriate content on their computer can have their computer wiped of all information and usage suspended or limited by the College. Please be advised that the auditing of computers takes place at the discretion of the school.

LEGAL STUDIES EXCURSION TO THE SUPREME COURT

On Friday the 16th of March, 2018, the Year 10 Law and Finance, Year 11 Legal Studies and Year 12 Legal Studies classes woke bright and early to travel to the Supreme Court in Melbourne to gain more knowledge on Victoria's legal system.

We arrived in Melbourne at around 9:30am and made our way to the Supreme Court to watch a murder trial. The cold case from 22 years ago was for the murder of 16 year old Ricky Balcombe of Geelong on the 5th of May 1995. We witnessed the cross examination of Paul Ballier, who was a friend of Ricky Balcombe's. The case was not as I had expected, like it is in the movies, but rather a slow process. It was interesting to see the lay out of a court room and the processes that are in place to make our legal system, fair, accessible and equal.

A conviction has not yet been made yet, although Karl Hague, the accused, was charged with murder later on in the year of Ricky's death, the case was dropped a week before it went to trial when two witnesses committed suicide and a third was unable to testify.

Then, we made our way to another court room and found ourselves in the presence of the Honourable Justice David Harper. Justice Harper answered many of our questions and gave us an insight into his life as a judge in the Supreme Court and the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals. His wisdom and knowledge of the legal system of Australia was inspiring and everyone was truly grateful for the time he gave us.

Our last stop for the day was at the County Court across the road from the Supreme Court, were we learnt about jury empanelment and did a role play where students got to take part in a jury empanelment. This was very informative and interesting, leading me to want to be on a jury, just for the experience.

Thank you to Mrs Johnston and Mrs Leslie for accompanying us on our day out.

ATTENTION ALL PARENTS

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund payment arrangements

The CSEF has changed to a term one application process and payment cycle.

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card are eligible to apply for a payment of \$225, which will be paid directly to the College to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs.

February/March 2018—Application forms to be completed and lodged with schools. However, the schools will be able to accept and process applications up until the end of term two.

1 March 2018—CSEF payments to school will commence from this date onwards. Regular payment runs will occur throughout terms one and two.
