MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Families,

Last Sunday's gospel was the story of the loaves and fishes. You will remember the outline: 5000 people follow Jesus to the shores of the Sea of Galilee. The disciples worry the people have no food, and there are too many to care for. Only one small boy offers up what he has: five small barley loaves and two dried fish. Jesus accepts the offering, says the blessing and starts handing out lunch. Astoundingly, 5000 people have plenty to eat. The scraps alone fill twelve baskets.

What is the point of this story? Jesus is able to work this wonder only when someone in the story is willing to share what he has. Even though what we may bring is not much by itself, when we give what we can, somehow, there is often enough to go around. Perhaps our example encourages others to contribute. The Kingdom of God can be glimpsed when many individuals all contribute and do their bit.

Which brings us to a modern miracle, our annual Walkathon. This year is walkathon number twenty. Our target is again \$20,000 dollars, which averages about \$40 per student. Every year, we reach our target. Why? Because each individual makes the effort to do their bit. Then, it was loaves & fishes. Now, it is dollars. Please do what you can to support the walkathon – your contribution does make a difference.

Congratulations and thank you to all the students who were involved in our very successful production of High School Musical.

The show filled the Wonthaggi theatre for FIVE performances, a wonderful achievement. When the cast all sang "We're all in this together", it was clear they really meant it. We are all very proud of you, thank you for sharing your gifts with us.

This week we have had the cyclic inspection of the College to ensure that it meets the requirements for registration under the Victorian Registration & Qualifications Authority (VRQA). This checks that child safety, curriculum, policy and facilities are all up to standard. It is our permission from government to operate as a school. I am pleased to report that the VRQA validators found all areas satisfactory and praised the College for its excellent preparation.

Many of our community are dealing with the death or serious illness of loved ones at present. Please keep them in your prayers. Just before term started, the husband of Mrs Mary Barrance became seriously ill. He is recovering in hospital but faces a long road back to health. In order to care for her husband, Mary has had to take indefinite leave from the College. Mary has asked that a letter from her to all our familes, especially our Learning Support families, be printed in this newsletter. In her absence, Mrs Jenny Shea has agreed to look after the running of Learning Support and Mrs Cate Kavanagh will take over Mary's Year 7 English Class. I thank them both for their willingness to help in this way and I am confident they will continue the excellent care of our students. On your behalf, I thank Mary for her wonderful care for our students and families over many years and wish her family well as they face the time ahead together.



FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL—WELLBEING AND ORGANISATION

COMMITMENT TO CHILD SAFETY

This Statement is intended to provide the central focus for child safety across Mary MacKillop College Leongatha, which is built around a unified understanding of the moral imperative and overarching commitments that underpin our drive for improvement and cultural change.

Our College sets out to be a school for the human person and of human persons. 'The person of each individual human being, in his or her material and spiritual needs, is at the heart of Christ's teaching: that is why the promotion of the human person is the goal of the Catholic school'. (Congregation for Catholic education 1997, par.9)

Our College holds the care, safety and wellbeing of children and young people as a central and fundamental responsibility. This commitment is drawn from and inherent to the teaching and mission of Jesus Christ, with love, justice and the sanctity of each human person at the heart of the Gospel.

Our College has a universal expectation about the protection of children. It is resolutely committed to ensuring that all those engaged in school life at our College promote the inherent dignity of children and young people and their fundamental right to be respected and nurtured in a safe school environment. This is particularly so for the most vulnerable children, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds and children with a disability.

Our College has a moral, legal and mission-driven responsibility to create a nurturing school environment where children and young people are respected, their voices are heard and where they feel safe and more importantly are safe. When allegations of abuse concerning children and young people are raised, our College staff, wellbeing team and leadership will take prompt action to have these allegations appropriately investigated. While the context and reality at our College will differ from other schools, the fundamental issues of understanding effective practices in child safety and identifying and responding to child harm remain the same. Our College will strive for continual improvement, initiating practices that respond to emerging thinking, evidence and practice, so as to eliminate the possibility of abuse occurring in the first place.

Creating child-safe school environments is a dynamic process that involves active participation and imposing responsibilities on schools, families and the broader community. Effective child – safe environments are underpinned by collaboration, vigilance and proactive approaches across policies, procedures, curriculum and practices.

Every person involved in our College has a responsibility to understand the important and specific role he/she plays individually and collectively in ensuring that the wellbeing and safety of all children and young people is at the forefront of all they do and every decision they make. Ministerial Order 870 defines the 'children and young people' in this document as those children and young people enrolled as students in Catholic Schools in Victoria.

In accordance with Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd, our College commits to providing a safe and nurturing culture for all children and young people in its care by:

1. Upholding our highest priority for the safety and wellbeing of children and young people

At all times, the ongoing safety and wellbeing of all children and young people will be the primary focus of care and decision-making, with particular attention paid to the cultural safety of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds, as well as the safety of children with a disability.

To create and maintain a safe and nurturing culture, our College will actively and continually develop and review all policies, processes and practices, informed by emerging thinking and evidence.

2. Empowering families, children, young people and staff to have a voice and raise concerns

Our College in partnership with families, will ensure children and young people, are engaged as active participants in decision-making processes, particularly those that have an impact on their safety.

This means that the views of staff, children, young people and families are taken seriously and their concerns are addressed in a just and timely manner. Children and young people are also provided with the necessary skills and knowledge to understand and maintain their personal safety and wellbeing.

3. Implementing rigorous risk-management and employment practices

Our College will systematically and continually identify and assess risks to child safety and will eliminate (where possible) or reduce all potential sources of harm. Effective risk management will be embedded in school life through effective, transparent and well-understood policies, procedures and practices.

Our College will employ highly competent professional staff who are informed and challenged to maintain the safety of all students. The high-quality of staff appointments will be upheld through rigorous employment and staff review processes and practices.

Our College will stay abreast of current legislation and will meet their legislative duties to protect the safety and wellbeing of children and young people in their care, including the Victorian Child Safe Standards (Victorian Government 2016), mandatory reporting, grooming, failure to disclose and failure to protect requirements.

Adhering to this commitment will ensure that Mary MacKillop College Leongatha will be a safe and nurturing culture for all children and young people attending the school.

YEAR 10 CAMP








Once again a Mary MacKillop student has had the privilege of participating in the Betty Amsden Youth Scholarship Course with Melbourne Theatre Company (MTC) over the school holidays. Every year Mary MacKillop is invited to apply for a scholarship for one student who best fits the criteria. This year Laura Muranty, the nominating teacher, chose Lily Smith from 9A, who is an aspiring drama student. She was accepted into the unique five day course with great success.


The course is run by a group of dynamic facilitators who work for MTC. They jam pack the program full of diverse experiences that students would normally be unable to access in a school program. They learnt about a broad range of dramatic styles and techniques, such as physical theatre and non-naturalistic conventions. They explored theatrical styles, such as Theatre of the Oppressed and Image Theatre. Each class provided an important learning aspect for acting and theatre making.



Lily said, at MTC I learnt many skills in drama especially from the guest artists who came in to help us explore different elements used in drama. I learnt about using rhythm when performing on stage, and that rhythm isn't about the sounds you can use and make, it's also about the way you may be moving in an area or time. I also learnt a lot about physical theatre and how you can create a story line by making a still frame, then creating a before and after picture to go with it.

One of the major highlights for me was meeting a lot of new people from all around Victoria and creating memorable friendships. I also got to go see inside the headquarters of the Melbourne Theatre Company and see where they keep the costumes, make wigs and hats as well as the props room. Another highlight was the play that I saw called, 'The House of Bernarda Alba'. It was an all-female cast with 7 actresses'. The story was about four sisters who face the struggle of living together after their father passes away and their eldest sister inherits all the money that they all thought was theirs. I really enjoyed watching this play and experiencing a professional theatre production.

I felt the experience of being with Melbourne Theatre Company, meeting new people and learning more about drama and acting has helped me grow as a performer and as a person. I feel a lot more confident in myself and in my acting skills. I am grateful that Mrs Muranty gave me the opportunity to improve on my drama skills and highly recommend the experience to any students interested next year.

AMBULANCE MEMBERS

All families are encouraged to be members of the ambulance service. At times of accidents or illness, the First Aid trained staff member/s in attendance will make a decision as to whether or not they should request the attendance of the ambulance service.

In doing so, the health and safety of the patient will be the only determining factor. Ambulance membership, or potential costs to families will not be a point of consideration. Such a decision will always be made with a conservative 'better safe than sorry' attitude. Parents (or next of kin for an adult) will always be contacted as soon as possible so that they may be in attendance when the ambulance arrives. A familiar staff member will always accompany a student to the hospital if the attending ambulance officers approve. Thank you.
