

PAM...the "Parent Access Module & Interim Reports:

At Mary MacKillop College, students access their work and assessment tasks through our online portal called SIMON all year round. This wonderful resource informs them of their daily timetable, lists the daily notices and ensures that they have quick and ready access to key learning materials. PAM...the "Parent Access Module" allows parents and guardians, access to much of this information as well. PAM access codes have been sent to all new families at the beginning of the year and all established families could use their existing code from last semester to access this site.

If you have misplaced your PAM login or need help finding these reports please contact reception at the College. Parents will now be able to gain access to students work when marked, see upcoming work submission dates, view teacher feedback and obtain school reports.

When considering school reports and teacher feedback:

Your kids will appreciate the right focus at report time.

Could try harder... always does her best... lacks concentration...easily distracted...a pleasure to teach...

School reports can mean anxious times for children too. 'Will my parents be disappointed or proud?' is the main concern of most children. Kids of all ages take their cues from their parents, so your reaction to their school report can affect the way they see themselves as learners and as people.

Focus your attention on these aspects to make sense of children's reports:

Expectations

Expectations are tricky. If they are too high, then kids can be turned off learning. Too low and there is nothing to strive for. Pitch your expectations in line with a child's abilities. A quick check of your child's last report cards may give you a good yardstick.

Different rates of learning

Remember there are slow bloomers, late developers and steady-as-you-go kids in every classroom, so avoid comparing your child to siblings, your friends' children and even yourself when you were young. Instead, look for individual progress.

Safeguard confidence

Self-confidence is a pre-requisite for learning, so be prepared to be as positive and encouraging as possible.

Here are 5 of Michael Grosse's ideas to think about before reading your child's report:

- 1) Look for strengths first. Focus on strengths even if they are not in the traditional 3R's or core subjects.
- 2) Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning. If the report indicates that effort is below standard, then you have something to work on. If your child is putting in the required effort, then you can't ask any more than that.

- 3) Broaden your focus away from academic performance to form a picture of your child's progress as a member of a social setting. How your child gets along with his or her peers will influence his happiness and well-being, as well as give an indicator to his future.
- 4) Take notice of student's self-assessment. Kids are generally very honest and will give a realistic assessment of their progress.
- 5) Discuss the report with your child about strengths first before looking at areas that need improvement. Ask your child how they performed and discuss their concerns.

Be mindful that no matter how good, bad or indifferent your child's report may be, he or she can wipe the slate clean and make a fresh start next term.

Pathways for the Future:

Thank you to all the families who attended our Subject Selection evening last week. In excess of 300 people attended to gain valuable information for all the various pathways on offer as students move into their senior schooling. The Pioneer Hall was decked out like a Trade Show, thanks to the great work of the curriculum staff, which provided a valuable opportunity for students and parents to ask specific questions of staff.

Our Careers Co-ordinator and Director of Learning Mrs Meg Steenholdt was also on call to help the Senior Students with course requirements. The College appreciates that this can be a very nervous time for parents so please do not hesitate to contact the College with any questions, or alternatively email any number of the leadership team if you have any questions about the process of pathways, subject selection of pathways.

YEAR 11 LEGAL STUDIES

The Victorian Drug Court is a division of the Magistrates' Court of Victoria that provides for the sentencing and supervision of the treatment of offenders with a drug and/or alcohol dependency who have committed an offence under the influence of drugs or alcohol or to support a drug or alcohol habit.

Unlike traditional courts, the Magistrate conducts a conference with a support team to discuss each offender appearing before the Drug Court that day. The students were given the opportunity to review the cases that were being discussed and listen to the Magistrate and support team make decisions regarding their Drug Treatment Orders. The Drug Court opened after all cases had been decided and the students were present to see the enforcement of these orders.

This was a powerful experience in restorative practice and rehabilitation. We had the opportunity to celebrate the small successes of the participants - three weeks of clean drug screens and the reward of museum passes, to the threat of prison days being enforced due to avoiding drug detection. At all times the participants were treated respectfully and they responded to the empathy shown to them.

A powerful day for all who participated and an insight into what a 'just society' truly looks like.

INTER-SCHOOL PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITION



On Thursday the 23rd of August, five Year 9 and 10 students competed in a GIS Inter-school Public Speaking Competition. This was the first competition of its kind in the GIS cultural event calendar. Lavalla College held the event, and organisers were honoured to have a high profile guest judge, Sally Warhaft. She is the editor of *The Monthly*, Australia's national magazine of politics, society and the arts. She is a regular commentator on ABC radio, as well as frequently participating in public debates, including guest spots on the ABC program, Q & A.

Sally opened the event with an inspiring speech about the importance of public speaking. She reiterated that communication is the backbone of our society. It allows us to form connections, influence decisions, and motivate change. Without communication skills, the ability to progress in the working world and in life, itself, would be nearly impossible.

All students were given the inspiring prompt from Malala Yousafzai, a young Palestinian activist for female equality and education. She said, "We realise the importance of our voices only when we are silenced." The quality of the speeches was extremely high. Mary Mackillop students wrote and spoke with great eloquence. Although there were no winning trophies, the judge made a special reference to the overall consistent quality of our students.



FROM THE BUS CO-ORDINATOR - LEONGATHA BUS NETWORK

A Reminder for parents of bus travellers that you are responsible for the safety of students at bus stops.

This morning we were notified of an incident that occurred on another school bus network last week. The parent was sitting in a car on the opposite side of the road to the bus stop. A child got off the school bus and proceeded to cross the road to the parent, but in the process was hit by another vehicle. Fortunately the child has escaped with only minor injuries!

Can parents please be proactive in collecting students from bus stops. Please park on the same side of the road if possible and leave plenty of room for the bus too. If you can't park on the same side of the road, please escort children across the road instead of watching from inside a car, especially with younger bus travellers. If a traveller needs to cross the road, they should wait for the bus to depart to ensure there is a clear view of any approaching traffic.

And, a reminder of this particular condition of travel that appears on the bus application form, for which your signature on the form signals you to agree to abide by:

RESPONSIBILITIES OF PARENTS/GUARDIANS

- Parents/guardians are responsible for transporting their children to and from authorised bus stops and their safety at the bus stop while waiting for the bus. Supervision is not provided at roadside stops. Parents/ guardians are responsible for their children upon disembarking the afternoon service.
- It is most important that parents waiting for bus passengers at a roadside bus stop should wait on the same side of the road as the bus, to prevent accidents.
- School bus travel is a privilege and not a right and consequences will follow a breach of these conditions. It is understood that bus travel is provided and accepted on these conditions.
