Dear Parents and Families,

This is our last newsletter for the Term. Term One has been a very busy and successful start to the College's Year. This weekend is the start of the school holidays with Easter at the end of the break before school returns.

Easter is celebrated as one Feast over 3 days, called the Easter Triduum. Easter, the Resurrection of Jesus, is the core of our faith. On Holy Thursday Mass, we re-enact Jesus' washing of his disciples' feet and remember his institution of the Eucharist. Mass ends silently with the removal of Jesus, reminding us of his arrest. No Masses are said anywhere in the world from Thursday night until the Easter Vigil.

Good Friday is so-called because by his Passion and death, Christ saved us all. This is remembered at the commemoration of the Passion in the afternoon. The third part of the Triduum is the Easter Vigil on Saturday night. This is where the Paschal Candle is lit from the Easter fire and we enter the church by candlelight.

At the vigil we hear the stories of creation and of God's covenant with his chosen people. These Easter services are unlike any others - even if you haven't been for some time, it is well worth attending. You will be very welcome.

We have had very good turnouts to our recent Parent/ Teacher/Student interviews and to our Open Mornings, held over 3 Fridays in March. Thank you to all our families for supporting these events in such numbers. The Grade 6 Activity Day is coming up on May 1st, with enrolments for 2020 due by the end of May. Demand for places at Mary MacKillop College continues to be strong. We endeavour to accommodate all eligible families, but please remind your friends & neighbours to apply on time or risk missing out.

The College will end the term with our Easter Liturgy at 12 noon in Pioneer Hall on Friday. Parents and families are most welcome to join us on the day. INSTITUTE OF GAMING – STUDENT AND COMMUNITY PRESENTATION

Last week, both students and the community listened to Steven Dupon. Steven is the Founder and Director of The Institute of Games. For the past 8 years, Steven has specialised in the impact video games are having on the health and wellbeing of children and young people. Steven approaches gaming from a carer's point of view, not from a gamer's point of view. He may not play games very often but he certainly has a great respect for the entertainment value of video games and considers video games to be a form of art, combining visual art, music, stories, and so on.

In the community session, Steven outlined that parents needed to have a thorough understanding of the potential impacts of different games. "I like to promote gaming as a family activity and if a young person is playing a game in the bedroom then parents should try and get to know the game".

"Parents should ... try to -involve themselves in the gaming."

Steven believes that an hour a day is considered a healthy amount of gaming, but parents should keep a close eye on their children's behaviour.

"If kids play obsessively and if they need the game to feel good, then that's where we're getting close to a mental health concern," he said.

Steven also recommends parents:

- * Always check the classification label
- * Don't allow young children to play online games where cyber safety could be a concern
- * Where possible, ensure children are gaming in a family room.

Snapchat

Snapchat is an app that allows users to share images and videos ('snaps') with friends. Before a user can access Snapchat, they must first create an account protected with a password. Typically, content shared with friends is 'ephemeral' and is deleted a short time after being viewed.

Recently, Snapchat released a new feature - 'Memories'. With Memories, users can preserve content in a secure archive on their phone. The feature includes a section called "My Eyes Only" - a PIN protected area where appropriate snaps can be stored.

The school is aware that some students have shared their Snapchat account passwords with friends or people they've met online. This has led to unauthorised individuals gaining access to account, and inappropriate or unwanted images or videos being shared, or threatened to be shared.

In some cases, once individuals have accessed an account, they're also requesting to know the user's 'My Eyes Only' PIN. Attempting to solicit information from a person in this way is a form of social engineering.

WHAT IS SOCIAL ENGINEERING?

Social engineering is the act of manipulating people into performing actions or divulging confidential information like passwords and PINs. The attacker uses social pressure, deception or threats to influence a person into doing something against their interests. Social engineering is not hacking.

Hacking involves the use of computer technologies to gain unauthorised access to systems and networks. Students sometimes use the term 'hacking' when in fact they have shared their password.

WHY IS SOCIAL ENGINEERING AN ISSUE?

Social engineering can be used to steal identities, violate people's privacy and to obtain 'high-value' information, such as intimate images. This type of cyber-threat can be subtle, and may appear as a simple request to help a friend. Spotting social engineering attempts can be challenging.

SELF-DEFENCE AGAINST SOCIAL ENGINEERING

Your child can decrease their chances of social engineering by following these steps:

- · Set strong passwords and PINs for all devices and accounts see more information on setting effective passwords
- · Use two-factor authentication to secure all accounts, including Snapchat
- · Never give out confidential information (even to friends) this includes passwords and PINs

Treat unsolicited emails with scepticism

• Review account activity regularly – most social networking sites and apps, including Snapchat, allow users to see where they're logged in and what apps or tools are connected.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL—WELLBEING AND ORGANISATION

WHAT TO DO IF YOUR SNAPCHAT ACCOUNT IS COMPROMISED

If your child's Snapchat account is compromised, and inappropriate images or videos have been accessed and shared with others, follow these steps:

- 1. Visit Snapchat's Safety Centre
- 2. Click on the "Report a safety concern" button
- 3. Choose the "Report a safety concern" option
- 4. Choose the "A Snap or Chat I've received" option
- 5. Choose the appropriate dropdown option (for example It contained nudity)

6. Click 'Yes" for the question "Still need help?" and fill in the required text boxes – try to provide as much information as possible in the 'What information should we know?' text box. This could include information about the particular way an account was compromised, or the ways in which intimate or embarrassing content has been shared without consent.

COMPLAINING TO THE OFFICE OF THE E-SAFETY COMMISSIONER

If Snapchat has not resolved your issue within 48 hours, you may be able to complain to the Office of the e-Safety Commissioner.

The e-Safety Commissioner will take action against cyberbullying material that is serious. Specifically, the material needs to seriously threaten, intimidate, harass or humiliate a child before we can step in. For information about the eSafety cyberbullying complaints scheme and to lodge a complaint see our website.

We encourage young people experiencing cyberbullying and related issues to contact the Kids Helpline. Their counsellors are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, free of charge. Counsellors can also chat online at Kids Helpline.

She cares for patients as they receive dialysis away from home. Patients also pass on their traditional knowledge.
