MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome back to all our families and students for second semester. I hope you had a pleasant break and all students are feeling refreshed and ready for the term. Term three is often the time of year when the most substantial concepts and topics are studied, when students consolidate their learning from the first half of the year and are ready to move onto new things.

Last week we held our Walkathon Launch Assembly. The Mary MacKillop Walkathon is a great tradition in our College – now in its 21st year. It incorporates three key elements: Firstly, it is an exercise in awareness raising – our community is helped to learn about issues faced by others in our midst and in the wider world.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - LEARNING AND TEACHING

Subject Selection & Pathways

All Year 9 students have recently attended the South Gippsland Trade Skills Alliance (SGTSA) Open Day to get and taste and insight to all the possible VET and vocational training options available in the region. Students attended sessions at Federation Training (Now TAFE Gippsland, Apprentices Group Australia and Community College Gippsland.) Students were given the opportunity to choose different streams of subjects ranging from:

Digital Programming
Automotive
Horticulture

Agriculture Hospitality Building Allied Health Hair/Salon/Beauty Plumbing

Engineering Business Electrical

This day was vital in getting students to start thinking about career opportunities and pathways. In addition to this all Year 9 students (with the exception of those in the French class) will study a compulsory unit of careers in their Launch subject utilising the government www.joboutlook.com.au website.

The subject information evening is coming up for those students to start thinking about the options available for their future pathway at the school. Year 10 students have also recently completed their week of work experience and will be undertaking compulsory pathway interviews conducted with the middle school leadership team and curriculum leaders.

While many students at this age already have some form of part time employment the work experience week is an excellent opportunity to see first-hand the work that people in their desired field do each day. The level of compliance has intensified over the last few years however the students strongly value the career experience so it has been a worthwhile investment.

In 2019 Mr Jack Pearce has taken the role of Middle School Leader – Pathways and has been working especially diligently with our applied learners within Year 10 for activities to engage them in their schooling. We currently have the largest crop of students enrolled in off-site VET courses. These include Child Care, Community Services, Horticulture, Sound Production, Equestrian, Electrical and Plumbing.

The 2020 subject information evening will be held on **Tuesday 20th August** in Pioneer Hall. A 'Trade Show' event will be held with a formal presentation for students entering Year 10 - 2020 and those entering the VCE for 2020. Subject areas will be running displays and all senior teachers will be on call to assist students and their parents with the subject selection process.

The senior team is also currently conducting their 45min personalised career/pathways interview with each Year 12 student (and their families). Initiated by Mrs Meg Steenholdt these have proven to be invaluable for all concerned and really form the basis of strong career and transition advice for our seniors.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL—WELLBEING AND ORGANISATION

We can learn to develop mindful awareness through a variety of everyday activities as well as formal meditation. It is important to remember that mindfulness can occur both on and off the cushion. While many of us might picture meditation as a person seated cross-legged on some special type of pillow, we can also practice mindfulness in a myriad of ways including mindful eating, walking, drawing, listening to music and even through photography. As a College, we are always looking for ways to teach students about mindfulness using a variety of techniques and tools.

The students have explored with their homeroom teacher that mindfulness practices are comprised of both curiosity and self-regulation. Firstly, we can intentionally cultivate a sense of curiosity or wonder about a particular experience or sensation. Secondly, we create focus and alertness by self-regulating our wandering mind. Our **#thismoment** photography competition has endeavoured to help the students to cultivate both curiosity and self-regulation through photography. We have asked students to be inquisitive about their environment, marvelling at everyday objects, whilst at the same time creating a focus for themselves through the lens of a camera. They immersed themselves in the moment by intentionally zeroing in on a particular detail or phenomenon, framing the camera in a way that helped them remove distractions and concentrate on their subject of focus.

At the College we endeavour to expand the student's mindful awareness of by exploring these kinds of activities and creating experiences where students are actively exercising curiosity and self-regulation.

PUBLIC SPEAKING

2019 South Gippsland Regional Legacy Junior Public Speaking Award

On Tuesday 23rd July Annika Clarke, Ava Strentz, Christine Denbrok and Grace Burns travelled to Bass Coast Council Chambers in Wonthaggi to compete in the Annual Legacy Public Speaking Award for secondary students aged 12-14 years.

Students spent their own time inside and outside their regular classes preparing and practising their speeches and worked with Mr Campbell (Librarian) and Mr Muranty (Head of English). All four participants used mainly lunchtimes to write, edit, rehearse and practice both prepared and impromptu speeches. Final preparations were marked with significant moments of pride and relief as students continually challenged themselves to develop better speaking skills. The greatest trepidation was reserved for the impromptu section of the competition as the fear of not knowing what to expect was at its highest.

On the day of competition all four year 8 students summoned courage and collective team support to embrace the opportunity before them. The four speeches students had chosen were presented as follows:

- Christine Denbrok created a sophisticated and factual argument about the rate of animal extinction today asking how did we let it come to this?
- Grace Burns presented a succinct, passionate account of gender equality and how that looks today.
- Ava Strentz produced innovative and engaging speech persuading the audience on why studying a musical instrument is good for your brain?
- Annika Clarke (Penny) presented a compelling account of how our legal system doesn't protect our youngest, titled 'Have you asked the Children'.

It was captivating to watch students from Newhaven and Korumburra Secondary talk about a range of issues that included sexual harassment, oil drilling in the Great Australian Bight, why we should stay away from social media and the reality of the Stolen Generation that continues to inflict untold grief on our indigenous people.

The students also presented impromptu speeches on the topic of 'belonging' which became their most challenging performance on the day and helped the judges to decide who would go through to the Preliminary Final in Dandenong on September 10th.

We are so very proud of our year 8 leaders who deserve much encouragement for their skill and dedication to perform so admirably on the day. When other students from other schools perhaps didn't have the best day and were not able to rise to the occasion in the same way – all our year 8 leaders reached out to provide comfort and support with grace, sincerity and humour. Congratulations to the team including Mr Campbell for his enthusiasm and knowledge. We wish Christine Denbrok and Grace Burns all the best now as they prepare for the next round, after winning the day! Congratulations also to Annika Clarke for coming third and to Ava Strentz whose speech should now be produced into a *Ted Talks* segment reaching the wider audience it deserves.


VCE CHEMISTRY EXCURSION TO MONASH UNIVERSITY

In the first week of Term 3, VCE Chemistry/Bioligy classes attended hands-on practical sessions offered by nearby universities.

The Unit 4 Chemistry students travelled to Monash University in Clayton on Tuesday 16 July for the 2019 Monash Organic Spectroscopy Symposium. This was an opportunity to use bench-top sized state-of-the-art instrumentation, normally reserved for second year undergraduate students, to collect spectroscopic data that previously the students had only seen in textbooks.

The Chemistry students also participated in a group activity called 'Chemical Detectives' which helped them to develop their teamwork and problem-solving skills to interpret spectroscopic data and figure out chemical structures within a limited time frame. Some reflections:

"The day was informative and broadened my knowledge of spectroscopy."

"The program was interesting and allowed us to learn about spectroscopy in an engaging and fun way, whilst gaining information from both students and professors of Monash University."

"The excursion was a great experience that let us see the equipment responsible for the data we are expected to interpret. It also allowed us to gain further experience in interpreting data to determine the identity of a chemical."

"The excursion was really helpful as it allowed the theory learned in class to match up with a practical use and how everyday chemists can use and apply spectroscopy."

"We were given demonstrations and aided in the operation of spectroscopy equipment. During these tasks, we were challenged to identify an unknown white powder which could only be determined after all activities were completed."

"The ability to use the equipment we have learnt about gave a deeper understanding on the topic itself and a practical side that would not have been experienced if we didn't attend."



AMBULANCE MEMBERS

All families are encouraged to be members of the ambulance service. At times of accidents or illness, the First Aid trained staff member/s in attendance will make a decision as to whether or not they should request the attendance of the ambulance service.

In doing so, the health and safety of the patient will be the only determining factor. Ambulance membership, or potential costs to families will not be a point of consideration. Such a decision will always be made with a conservative 'better safe than sorry' attitude. Parents (or next of kin for an adult) will always be contacted as soon as possible so that they may be in attendance when the ambulance arrives. A familiar staff member will always accompany a student to the hospital if the attending ambulance officer approves.

VCE BIOLOGY EXCURSION TO FEDERATION UNIVERSITY

The Unit 4 Biology students travelled to Federation University in Churchill on Wednesday 17^t July. They were given a quick safety briefing before entering a working microbiology lab where they were given a chance to engage in two of the DNA manipulation techniques that were recently taught in class.

The activity leader gave a short explanation of what gel electrophesis is and then each student had the opportunity to pipette a small sample into each of the wells of gel. After the power was turned on, the samples that were placed in the well started to separate based on DNA fragment size.







The second technique that was investigated was the transformation of bacteria with a recombinant plasmid. The students were able to force bacteria to take up some DNA that had an antibiotic resistance gene inserted into it. They tested how successful they were by putting them onto agar plates that contained an antibiotic called ampicillin. If the experimental bacteria grew on these plates, it meant that the bacteria had in fact been transformed. All groups were successful in this endeavour!

It was a fantastic learning experience for all as it allowed them to put into practice what they had learnt in class.

Dear Students and Families,

From time to time there are enquiries about receiving the Sacraments of the Catholic Church. Normally such enquiries are referred to Parishes where the Rite of Chrisitan Initiation of Adults (RCIA) Program is established.

The RCIA Program is a series of meetings with lay people of the parish. Instruction and discussion is undertaken about the life of Jesus, the function of the church and the role of sacraments. If after instruction, an enquirer wishes to proceed, they will receive the sacraments they need at the Easter ceremonies.

Firstly, some background, we are a Catholic School and we promote Catholic faith. However, these days, there is growing recognition that we are part of a broader pilgrim church and we recognise the work of the Holy Spirit in other Christian denominations. Many of our students are now from other Christian denominations.

With this in mind, there is growing recognition that a person may start out in the Catholic tradition and have transferred to another Christian denomination for various reasons. Such a person may wish to return to the Catholic Church and be admitted to receive certain sacraments. Or simply, they may wish to become Catholic for the first time.

Mary MacKillop College is willing to assist any enquiries about the faith to the extent of the setting up an RCIA Program at the school for a student or parent wishing to receive the sacraments of the church. Initial interest should be directed to Mr John Ryan, Deputy - Catholic Identity and Mission.



At our walkathon launch assembly last week we heard from each of this year's charities. All well deserving and again we are asking students and families to raise money for them:


- \$6,000 to Free 3D Hands (Based at Cowes) Mat Bowtell

- \$1,000 to Trinity Families (annual charity)






